Joe Ernest Robins, 101, of Travelers Rest, husband of the late Mary O'Dell Robins, passed away Monday, March 15, 2021 at his home.

Born in Greenville County, he was a son of the late Edward Norton and Mamie Brazie Robins. He was owner of Robins Lumber before retirement, Army Captain, veteran of WWII, 1943 graduate of Clemson College, and a member of Enoree Baptist Church.

He is survived by a son: Joe E Robins, Jr.; daughter: Jill Blanton(Devon); grandsons: Evan Blanton, Eric Blanton(Logan); great-grandchildren: London, Joshua, Sarah Jo Blanton; and sisters: Evelyn Montayne, Vivian Foster, June Dickerson(John).

“ In the late ‘60s (my high school years) I was fortunate to have befriended Joe and Mary Robins along with daughter Jill and son Joe who were members of the same church my Dad and Mom attended. Having a mutual interest in music (son) Joe and I got together playing in many bands over the ensuing years with his folks somehow putting up with all the chaos and racket as we gathered at their residence for practice, repeatedly making a mess of their well kept, tidy living room what with all the instrumentation and equipment strewn about. They didn’t have to do that. But they did. When my parents marriage was on the rocks and eventually failed, Joe and Mary stepped in and filled a void by keeping me out of mischief and employed me at their saw mill (with lots of time flexibility given I was still in school). They didn’t have to do that. But they did. Later they generously provided me room and board in what was once their starter home known as “the Little House”. I regularly showed up for yummy lunches and dinners at Mary’s table! They didn’t have to do that. But they did. For a time Big Joe (or The Boss as I called him) brought his skills in managing a business to one of our musical group iterations. Not just with his words but also with deeds and his physical presence. How he was able to work a full day at the mill then leave out with the band to drive sometimes hours to the gig, stayed there as the band played on for hours, helped pack up gear and load afterward, then drove us back home the same night... This could only be accomplished by a man having incredible commitment and stamina (and a wife with endless patience). They didn’t have to do that. But they did. When a passenger in his car on those many trips I listened when he espoused his view of the world, offering advice, perspective or recommendations. These frequently were woven with iterations of his own life experiences, to the point and often blended with humorous moments underscoring those examples. As the decades passed I’ve had many occasions to warmly recall those memories, those good times. After retirement from my professional career I was able to stop by and visit Joe and Mary at their home on a much more regular basis. It was always so good to see them, catch up on things and reminisce. What an honor and pleasure it has been to

know Joe and Mary. They were very much a second Dad and Mom to me in so many ways and I will so deeply miss them.
